ON-SITE ARCHIVE

The Don D. Jackson Archive contains collections of writings from MFT founders, reel-to-reel recordings of sessions and conferences, unpublished research materials, rare photographs, first editions books, and more, dating back to the inception of the field. The body of research contained in the archives provides a unique resource to ULM Ph.D. students and researchers from other universities in writing and defending dissertations.

SUPERVISORY CREDENTIALS

Marriage and Family Therapy Ph.D. students have the opportunity to earn credentials as American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy (AAMFT) Approved Supervisors by supervising MFT Master of Arts students under the mentorship of AAMFT Approved Faculty Members.

A teaching track is also available in which Ph.D. students have the opportunity to teach within the MFT undergraduate minor program, allowing the more advanced students to serve as mentors to undergraduate students considering MFT as their career choice.

HOW TO APPLY

In an effort to maintain a family-style, cohort model, a limited number of students are admitted to the Marriage and Family Therapy Master of Arts Program. Students should apply before the **February 1 Priority Deadline**. Applications submitted after this deadline will be considered only if spots have not been filled.

Prospective students submit applications to ULM's Graduate School, and subsequently to the Marriage & Family Therapy Program. Upon acceptance into the Graduate School, the MFT Admissions Committee will review applications, and invite select individuals to participate in group and individual Interviews.

NOTE: Admission to ULM Graduate School does not guarantee admission into the Marriage and Family Therapy program.
